

List of Grievances by Negro Athletes Is Nearly a Year Old

MADISON Wis. (AP)—A list of grievances that precipitated a boycott of the University of Wisconsin football banquet last month by Negro athletes is nearly a year old. The Associated Press learned Monday.

Marshall H. Colston, a university faculty member, said all but one of the grievances were given to the Athletic Department 10 months ago. He said the only new item among the seven "demands" was for an annual re-evaluation of the coaching staff.

"The university's administration has been working on the grievances for the past 10 months," Colston said. "And, the administration has worked toward resolving these problems without reservation."

In an interview, Colston said, the ability to air grievances through regular channels was "responsible for the University of Wisconsin not having the problems that other schools have had."

Always Open

"The boys know that the administration's door is always open to them for discussion of any problems," he said.

Topics included an alleged shortage of counseling; stacking of black players at one position; shifting of players to positions other than those they had been recruited for; dormitory freedom; a five-year scholarship program to allow athletes to remain in school until graduation, and more student recruiting.

"There have been many misleading and, in some cases, untrue statements made about this situation," Colston said. "It's time that the public is made aware of the background of the student discontent and all of the facts."

A Negro, Colston has served as vice chairman of the Madison Mayor's Commission on Human Rights as commissioner on the Wisconsin Governor's Commission on Human Rights. He is also a former president of the Madison National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

The dispute broke into the open two days before Thanksgiving when 18 black players, including all of those on the varsity squad, boycotted the annual banquet. Since then, one assistant coach, Gene Felker, has resigned, accusing a "brightened" university administration of failure in "handling student unrest on the campus."

Threaten Boycott

"One course said black athletes had threatened to boycott the Minnesota game, but Colston disagreed."

"They want to graduate from school and they want to play football," he said. "They didn't want to do anything that might interfere with either goal."

Colston also explained Felker's charge that the lone Negro assistant coach, Les Ritcherson, had a five-year personal contract while each white assistant was given a one-year contract.

Ritcherson, Colston said, had a good job with security and a home in Waco, Tex., when he was approached about joining the Wisconsin staff. Since he knew that Milt Bruhn, then head coach, was under fire, he asked for security.

"He has a gentleman's agreement with the school president, Fred H. Harrington, that he will be employed by the university for at least five years," Colston said.

"He (Ritcherson) has a bachelor's degree in sociology and a masters in counseling, so he is well qualified in addition to his outstanding coaching abilities. He can be reassigned to another department as any of the other coaches can be," he said.

Same Security

"Felker or any of the other assistant coaches could have asked for the same type of security when they were hired," Colston said. "They didn't have to sign one-year contracts."

Adding to the furor is the fact that Ritcherson's son, Lew, is a junior quarterback on the team. Although he began the year as the starter, he saw less action then either John Ryan or Bob Schaffner, two white seniors.

Colston said he recognized future problems might arise because of the father-son relationship, and advised the elder Ritcherson to send his son to "Nebraska or California or some other school."

According to Colston, Ritcherson said his son was a good football player and Wisconsin needed good football players.

As a freshman, Lew Ritcherson combined with end Mel Reddick to lead Wisconsin to a victory over Michigan. He played a split end position his sophomore year and was moved back to quarterback this year. He has yet to earn a letter.

Reddick, a spokesman for the Negro athletes, said the players' dispute had no connection with other black student protests on the Madison campus, nor at any other school.

No Chance

Players indicated they wanted to keep the incident confined to school officials so that militant groups on campus, both black and white, would not have a chance to create controversy.

UCLA Holds Fast; Grabs All 30 First-Place Poll Ballots

UCLA and North Carolina continued their domination of The Associated Press major college basketball poll today, but once you get past them, anything goes.

Duke and St. Bonaventure replaced Kansas and Houston in the Top Ten while Davidson, New Mexico, Cincinnati and Villanova gained ground and Kentucky and Notre Dame also dropped back.

UCLA, meanwhile, held fast, grabbing all 30 first-place votes after beating Ohio State and Notre Dame last week, and North Carolina took every second-place ballot following victories over Oregon twice and Kentucky.

Drop One

The loss dropped Kentucky from third to fourth place with Davidson jumping from a sixth place tie to third with victories over Furman and Vanderbilt, which fell from 12th out of the rankings.

New Mexico tripped Hawaii twice and rose from eighth to No. 5 and Cincinnati walloped Kansas State and North Dakota State, moving it up three places to sixth.

Villanova, 10th last week, took the No. 8 spot after beating Princeton and Philadelphia Textile and the Bonnies hammered Detroit College and St. Francis, Pa., to move from 11th and 10th.

Duke made the biggest leap on the strength of victories over Alabama and Princeton. The

Blue Devils jumped from 16th to ninth.

Falls Two Spots

Notre Dame fell two places to seventh while Kansas dropped even farther, from fourth to 11th, after losing to Wisconsin. Houston, a loser to Southern California, plummeted from a tie for sixth to 12th.

LaSalle, grabbing No. 20, was the only new face in the Top Twenty that is missing Tennessee and Marquette along with Vanderbilt.

Ohio State's loss to UCLA cost the Buckeyes four places, to 17th. Western Kentucky, No. 15, and Santa Clara, No. 16, each rose two places, and Purdue, No. 13, Detroit, No. 15, California, No. 18, and Iowa, No. 19, each moved up one notch.

Defends Six-State Title Tonight

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Joe Frazier is a 1-1 favorite to successfully defend his six-state heavyweight championship tonight in a scheduled 15-rounder against Oscar Bonavena of Argentina.

Frazier agrees with the odds-makers. "I'll smoke him out in six," claims the confident champion from Philadelphia.

"He's gonna go," says Frazier of the curly, black-haired Argentine, who two years ago twice knocked him down before losing a hotly disputed split decision in New York.

Green

"That was two years ago and I was green," Frazier retorts when reminded of the double knockdown and the close verdict. "I've learned a lot since then. That's why I wanted Bonavena again. I wasn't happy with the first fight, either."

Bonavena, however, doesn't lack for confidence. He boasts a 36-4 record with 27 knockouts and predicts a victory.

"I'll knock him out and take the title home to South America," Bonavena asserts.

The 26-year-old Bonavena tried a little psychology on Frazier at their recent physical examination. He shook his right fist in the champion's face and asked pointedly, "Remember this?"

There was no doubt in the minds of any onlookers, including Frazier's, that the challenger was building his confidence on those two first-fight knockdowns.

Frazier is unbeaten in 21 fights and won the heavyweight title of New York, Massachusetts, Maine and Illinois last March 4 with an 11th-round technical knockout over previously unbeaten Buster Mathis. Lather, his home state of Pennsylvania belatedly recognized the Frazier title claim, followed by New Jersey.

In his first defense, Frazier knocked out Manuel Ramos of Mexico in the second round and thereby added Mexico to his domain. Jimmy Ellis of New York, World Boxing Association heavyweight champion, is recognized as king elsewhere.

Cassius King?

Ring Magazine still lists Cassius Clay as the reigning title holder, despite his conviction on draft evasion charges.

Only two opponents have gone the distance with Frazier since the 1964 Olympic heavyweight gold medal winner turned professional. They were Bonavena and George (Scrap Iron) Johnson.

Both of these ranked the champion, especially the Bonavena decision. Frazier wants to be the first man to kayo the gritty South American.

Bonavena dropped Frazier twice in the second round of their Sept. 21, 1966, fight at Madison Square Garden.

The only other time Frazier has hit the deck was in his second fight, when Mike Bruce sent him down for an automatic eighth count with a right to the chin.

Wolverines Rip Duke; North Carolina Wins

Powerful North Carolina kept rolling along, out Duke wasted little time in failing to uphold a lofty reputation in college basketball warfare Monday night.

The Tar Heels, ranked No. 2 behind idle UCLA in today's Associated Press poll, trailed by a point at halftime before rallying to whip Vanderbilt 100-78 at Charlotte.

But Duke, elevated from 16th to ninth in the rankings this week, was upset on its own court by Michigan, 90-80.

Vanderbilt fired away at a 54.8 per cent clip to take a 40-39 halftime edge. But 6-foot-8 Bill Bunting fired in nine points in a spree that lifted North Carolina into control at 63-54 midway through the final half.

Bunting finished with a career high 22 points to share honors with teammate Dick Grubar as the Tar Heels won their fourth straight. Vanderbilt, ranked No. 12 a week ago, suffered its second loss in three games.

Tonjanovich High

Michigan's Rudy Tonjanovich tapped in a bevy of offensive rebounds in picking up 29 points in firing the upset of Duke—the Blue Devils first loss in four games.

Michigan led 41-36 at the half, then outscored Duke 11-1 midway through the second half to put it out of doubt.

Meanwhile, two other teams in the Top 20—Kansas and LaSalle—scored easy victories, while No. 15 Western Kentucky had to struggle to stop St. Francis, Pa., 70-68.

No. 11 Kansas rolled past Xavier of Ohio 79-56 and No. 920 LaSalle put down Rider 77-59.

Kansas befuddled Xavier with an aggressive zone defense while racing to a 36-24 halftime lead. The Jayhawks then ripped in seven straight points after intermission and it was no contest after that. Phil Harmon led a balanced attack with 16 points.

Jim McDaniels, Western Kentucky's 7-foot center, polished off a 23-point performance with a three-point play with 33 seconds left, enabling Western to win its fifth straight.

LaSalle's Larry Cannon drilled in 13 of his 22 points in the final nine minutes to turn off a Rider rally and give the Explorers their second straight.

One Point

Unbeaten Georgia permitted Alabama only one point in the final 1 1/2 minutes to pull off an 80-73 Southeastern Conference victory.

Gene Williams scored six of his 20 points, blocked three shots and stole the ball once in the overtime session to help Kansas State sidetrack Indiana 87-63.

Johnny Arthur flipped in 31 points to lead Tulane to a 108-88 conquest of previously unbeaten Rice.

In other games, Illinois stopped North Dakota 83-51, Northwestern defeated Colorado 83-66, Drake beat Marquette 68-63, Oklahoma ousted Texas Tech 83-74, Oklahoma State topped South Dakota State 72-67, Arkansas edged Centenary 64-61 in overtime.

Also Samford beat Mississippi State 68-59, Lamar tech stopped Texas A&M 98-87, Air Force checked Arkansas State 76-58, Iowa State trounced San Fernando State 97-61 and Texas-El Paso sidetracked Southern Colorado State 94-81.

Friday 13th a Lucky Day for Geese

MANITOWOC — Friday the 13th may be unlucky for most persons but the nation's wild-geese population consider it their lucky day. The season ends at the close of shooting time Friday in the Badger State.

Wisconsin goose hunters enjoyed a much better season this year than in 1967, says the federal Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.

The state's 1968, Canada goose quota was 20,000 birds and, by Dec. 4, more than 20,700 had been bagged, the federal wildlife agency reports. The bureau does not expect the final total to be much larger.

All Wisconsin goose hunters were required to have a special federal goose hunting permit this year. The permit included a tag to attach to the hunter's goose plus a pre-addressed hunting report card.

Total goose kill is determined from reports submitted by hunters. Both federal and state law required hunters to report on their goose hunting success or lack of success.

Since the number of tags to be issued to goose hunters next year may depend on the number of hunters reporting this year, all Badger State goose hunters were reminded today to send in their reports promptly.
