What you can do is to come to the Regent's Meeting tomorrow at 9:00 a.m. in room 1825 Van Hise Hall and demand that the University of Wisconsin sell its stock. The Regents Meeting is open to the public by law.

Over one month ago Dr. King was gunned down in a Memphis motel. In commemoration of this even 15,000 U.W. students walked around the block and split out early for spring break. It is now time to take action in a manner which will truly honor the man and his dream. It is now time to answer the question so many of us asked at that time - "What can I do?"

STUDENT DEMANDS TO BOARD OF REGENTS

1. That the Regents hold an emergency meeting on Monday, May 20, by twelve noon to discuss the sale of the Chase Manhattan stocks.
2. That the Regents vote to sell the stock.
3. That the 230,000 dollars from the stocks be used to establish a scholarship fund for minority group students.
4. That a policy making committee be formed, composed of minority group students to maintain authority over the fund and to discuss policy for the use of this fund.
5. That the University hire a black co-worker to Mrs. Doyle's Special Scholarship Committee, who would be approved by the above policy making committee and would be equal to Mrs. Doyle in terms of supervisory capacity.
6. Since we reject as illegitimate the use of University disciplinary actions against students participating in political activities, we demand that no reprisals be taken against students participating in any such action.
